The Diploma in Social Science (Policing) is ideal for students who have not gained direct entry into the NSW Police Force, Bachelor of Policing or Bachelor of Criminal and Community Justice at UWS and want the opportunity to improve their entry qualifications while preparing for university study. The diploma also provides both social science and criminology units that form the basis for further study in the Bachelor of Criminal and Community Justice degree program.

#### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

#### Domestic students only

To be eligible for entry, you must have:

- » a minimum ATAR of 50, and
- » successfully completed Australian Year 12 or equivalent or UWSCollege University Foundation Studies or equivalent with a Grade Point Average of 5.5 or higher.
- » completed study in English at senior high school level or achieved a "C" result in University Foundation Studies English at UWSCollege.

**Note:** Entry scores are indicative only. Other factors may be taken into consideration.

**Note:** NSW Police — Professional Suitability Assessment (PSA) must be undertaken during your period of study for entry in to the NSW Police Force.

#### TERM DURATION

Each term is 14 weeks including one examination week and a oneweek mid-term break.

#### **ENTRY TO UWS**

When you successfully complete\*\* your **UWS**College Diploma in Social Science (Policing), you will be granted advanced standing of 80 credit points (that is, eight (8) units of study) in the UWS Bachelor of Policing or UWS Bachelor of Criminal and Community Justice at UWS.

## ENTRY INTO NSW POLICE COLLEGE (ASSOCIATE DEGREE IN POLICING PRACTICE (ADPP))

If you are seeking a career with the NSW Police Force, you are required to undertake a professional suitability assessment (PSA). You must satisfy the professional suitability criteria and complete a medical and psychometric test before any offer of police employment is made.

The PSA is usually completed before 30 June each year and the medical and psychometric test is offered towards the end of the second year of the degree.

In addition, you are required to complete the Associate Degree in Police Practice (ADPP). UWS Bachelor of Policing students commence the ADPP Sessions 1a and 1b residental studies at the NSW Police Academy in Goulburn, during the Autumn and Spring semesters, of their second year of study at UWS. Prior to commencing the third year (also referred to as stage 2 of the Charles Sturt University (CSU) study program) of the UWS degree will be required to take place in an 80 hour placement that is managed by NSW Police.

Providing students have met all of the criteria regarding the NSW Police Professional Suitability, completing 1a and 1b residential studies, 80 hour placement and completing the 16 allocated subjects in the UWS Bachelor of Policing degree they will be eligible to complete Session 2 (also referred to as third year of the UWS Bachelor of Policing degree). During Session 2 students will undertake additional full-time residential studies at the NSW Police Academy. If successful you will be sworn in as NSW Police Officers at the completion of Session 2.

#### **COURSE FEES**

The Diploma in Social Science (Policing) is covered by a HECS-HELP loan and is available to eligible students enrolled in Commonwealth supported places (CSP). A HECS-HELP loan will cover all or part of the student contribution amount.
